From the Manager

 \mathbf{W} hy does summer go so fast? Fall is upon us and it's time to look to the winter projects.

The final phase of the Electric Upgrade Project was started on Monday September 8th. The project will be divided into 2 parts, The C-section will be done first and then the A section. Our maintenance crew will be doing the digging portion of the project which will start at the Rec hall on Jellystone and proceed up to the transformer located at lot C134. The digging will then continue down Butterfly Blvd to the Transformer located at lot C152.

This part of the project should take about 3 weeks to complete. During this portion of the digging, except for September 8 & 9th, the electric will not have to be turned off. After we reach the transformer on lot C152, around the first of October, the C Section will be completed.

We will then have to dig from lot to lot thru the A section. During this part of the project the electricity will have to be shut off daily in the A & C Sections from 8:30 am to 3:30 pm. It will be turned back on around 3:30pm and remain on until 8:30am each morning. This will take place around the first of October until we reach the last transformer in the A section. We are anticipating about a month to complete the digging in the A-Section.

REMINDERS:

- Winter usage of your membership is restricted to 3 nights in a calendar week- Sunday to Saturday from December 15th to March 1st. You are permitted to have a 2 week vacation during this time but it cannot be used in conjunction with your 3 days for the week and you must apply for this at the office.
- Water hoses must be disconnected from the hydrant from November 1st to April 1st when the member is not in residence. If you do not disconnect your hydrant & it breaks, there is a \$150 fee to replace it.
- No heat tape can be used on water lines.
- Canvas awnings are to be taken down in winter due to no weight allowance.
- All electricity (with the exception of a trailer refrigerator and one dusk to dawn light or one motion light) must be turned off when the member is not in residence during the off-season.

Please remember to notify the office if your address, phone number or email address has changed.

Have a warm and safe winter and see you in the spring.

As the camping season comes to an end, it is time to prepare for another season...the flu season. Since flu season has begun, I would like to recommend that everyone gets his or her immunization. The flu vaccine is available for everyone ages 6 months and older. Vaccines are approved for various age groupings and are even recommended for women that are pregnant.

Caregivers of the elderly or sick and those handling babies, including parents and grandparents, and those with chronic health issues should be vaccinated.

However; there are some individuals that should **not** get the vaccine, some reasons include:

- If you have had a severe life threatening allergy or reaction to the flu vaccine in the past
- If you are allergic to eggs do not get the vaccine.
- If you have been diagnosed with Guillain-Barre' Syndrome, in which the immune system damages the nerve cell causing severe muscle weakness.
- If you currently have any flu like symptoms
- Running a fever

Prevention is the best medicine and there are 5 things you can do to help the spread of the virus.

- Get the vaccine
- Cover up when coughing or sneezing
- Wash your hands frequently and take every day preventative actions to stop the spread of germs
- Take antiviral meds when prescribed by your doctor
- Limit contact with others if you become ill

I hope this helps to educate you in regards to the flu vaccine. Remember this is one more way to keep yourself as healthy as you can during this season. Take care!

Important Golf Cart Tips

Taking care of your loved golf cart by doing simple maintenance can save you money and down time. As the season gets underway along with the events and facilities our wonderful campground provides for us, there is nothing more frustrating than having a broken down golf cart.

Golf cart dealers in our surrounding area will pick your cart up, fix it and return it, however the experience is not at all pleasurable. The truth is you may not get your cart back between 3 to 6 weeks and sometimes longer. The reason for this is that they service many other campgrounds and become backlogged. You are just a number on the waiting list if you get that far. Once they do pick it up there is a fee for hauling back and forth, hourly service (\$45.00 hour or more) and that is not counting parts marked up in price double what internet golf companies sell them for.

I was approached and asked if I might write this article with the hopes of helping many fellow campers new and old. Here are some valuable tips to keep your golf cart up and running all season long by using common sense.

Charging your batteries: Check the water level by removing the caps. The lip inside the hole is an indicator of where the water should be. The water should touch or be filled to the bottom of that lip. The reason for this is that the battery has air space for it to vent out of the caps. The caps should be cleaned once a season because the small holes get clogged and slowly choke the life out of the battery. To do this, Toss the caps into a hot bucket of soapy water (dish soap) for 20 min. Rinse with a hose and put them back on. Keep the tops of your batteries clean will add years of life to your batteries. While batteries charge they spew a blackish film causing a negative field across from one battery to the next causing the batteries to discharge or lose power faster than normal. It can also cause battery terminals and any nearby metal parts to corrode.

Water levels in your batteries are very critical. Use only distilled water (about 85 cents a gallon) don't be a cheapskate and use your hose water that has minerals and damages the inside plates of your batteries. During the hot summer months, be sure to check the levels every 2 weeks .A small plastic funnel and 3 gallon of distilled water is all you will need. Just add a little to each cell as needed.

The wires on your batteries that seem to go everywhere and boggle your brain at a glance are vital to charging your cart. First, put the cart in tow while checking for loose or corroded wires. Bad wires cause numerous electrical problems throughout the entire cart. Loose wires and no water in your batteries can possibly cause your charger to catch fire, damage batteries, motors, controllers and solenoids.

After you have checked and done all of the above there is something I have to tell you that will take a very good set of ears or a hearing aid turned to Max. How to properly use your charger: All automatic chargers have built in sensors that read your batteries power connected to a timer. (Older chargers have an hourly dial used manually). When using the automatic type... First, plug the male end of the chord from the charger into your cart. Listen for a click that can be faint from the charger. This action is telling you the chargers timer is set and ready. Next step is to plug the chargers AC cord into the wall outlet.

There are many different kinds of chargers out there and 99 percent of them should be used as I described above, whether they are digital or meter type. Check your manual to be sure. Ok, so you have 3 kids that want to use the cart before it is actually finished charging or only 1/2 charged or it has not shut off on its own or you are having a bingo withdraw or you need the cart now. No problem! Unplug it from the wall first, then the cart.

The cart can be properly charged over night to its full capacity. Keep in mind that if your cart is less than 1/2 charged you may be pushing it back, which is not fun as I am sure many of you have witnessed throughout the years or painfully experienced. For safety reasons never leave your charger plugged in when not in camp for the protection of your cart and charger. The meter on your charger reads 0-30. 30 being less charge and zero being full charge. Having a battery indicator gauge installed on your carts dash is a good, inexpensive idea.

Let us finish up on what to do when camping season ends and you return to the real world. If you have kept the water levels correct in the batteries during the season, you will not need and should not add water to them when you close up camp. The water in the batteries has now had time to change to acid. Adding fresh water before you leave is a big giant NO. This makes the batteries vulnerable to freeze and cracking. Batteries at the going rate of \$100 each x 6... Well \$600 of course plus installation, pickup and your cart is still on the waiting list. I am sure you get the picture. The last remaining thing is to fully charge your cart, put it in tow if there is a tow switch and take one wire off any battery, negative or positive does not matter. Cover up your cart with a tarp that does not let snow or cold wind come from underneath.

I hope by following some simple basic steps you can make your camping days more enjoyable. If you are unable to maintain your cart, several fellow campers in the park do work on golf carts in their spare time for a reasonable cost.

Rule Changes to Remember

A few changes to our rules and policies were made this 2014 season. The first change stated that "no pets are allowed" in campground buildings and areas posted with "no pet" signs. So please watch for the signs.

The next change reads, "In an effort to conserve our utilities, water hydrants must be shut down and air conditioners must be turned off when RV unit is unoccupied for more than 48 hours. Exterior lights must be turned off during the daylight hours."

In addition, additional language was added to the first paragraph of Rule 7 (regarding building permits). It reads, "If an alteration to your lot is completed but fails to comply with Rule 7, you will be notified by the Manager that you have 14 days to revise your alteration to bring it into compliance with Rule 7. Non-compliance after 14 days will result in a Major Offence, which could include a \$100.00 fine and/or suspension from the Campground.

THE CHEMISTRY OF FALL COLOR

From The Farmers' Almanac 2015

Did you know the vivid colors of those beautiful fall leaves are the product of the complex chemistry of growth inside the leaves?

Oranges and yellows, for example, come from compounds called carotenoids (also responsible for the color of carrots) which are present in the leaf during the growing season. The green chlorophyll, the workhorse of photosynthesis, dominates and covers up the carotenoids in summer. However, as the temperatures cool, chlorophyll degrades and goes from green to colorless allowing the oranges and the yellows to show up.

What about those gorgeous scarlet, crimson and ruby hues we love so much? Trees that turn red actually produce this pigment in the autumn. The answer as to why some trees produce red pigment in their leaves is still unclear. But, clearly, we enjoy them!

What makes for a colorful fall? Starting in August, days must be sunny and the nights steadily cooling. This allows the trees to manufacture sugars and keep the sugars in the leaves to stimulate them to make red pigment. Too many clouds, too much rain or too much heat in the eight month can make for a duller fall. Drought is the other enemy of a colorful fall. The trees have to be in a healthy state, not water stressed, going into the season. We just may be headed for a very colorful fall.

Want your own fall show? Small trees with reliable fall color include flowering dogwood (crimson leaves), redbud (yellow leaves), and Japanese maple (orange to crimson leaves). Excellent fall color featured in large trees include "October Glory" red maple (uniformly red leaves), sugar maple (orange leaves), and katsura tree (yellow leaves).
