

As remarkable as Van Gogh's brilliant paintings was his passionate, ill-fated life and mysterious death. "Loving Vincent" was first shot as a live-action film before being hand-painted frame-by-frame in oils. The final effect is the interaction of the performance of the actors playing Van Gogh's famous portraits and the performance of the painting animators, bringing these characters into the medium of paint.


